## Scuola Superiore per Mediatori Linguistici “P.M. Loria” - Società Umanitaria

The *Società Umanitaria* is one of the historic institutions in Milan. An ethical institution, it was founded in 1893 through the testamentary legacy of Prospero Moisè Loria, a patron of Mantovan origin. Loria attributed to the word "humanitarian" not just the meaning of simple charitable almsgiving, but rather the value of concrete assistance through study, education, and work.

Today, the *Umanitaria* continues its mission to promote the intellectual and moral advancement of citizens, with an intense social and cultural activity. This includes projects aimed at preventing school dropouts

(*Programma Mentore*) and combating isolation among young people and the elderly (*Corsi Humaniter*), along with University (such as the *Scuola Superiore per Mediatori Linguistici*) and professional training courses in areas

like fashion, design, makeup, baking, and green spaces. In addition, there is a rich cultural programming calendar.

Having passed the milestone of 125 years, the strong community roots and the effectiveness of its ongoing projects are proof that the *Società Umanitaria* has successfully “reinvented itself” and found its role in contemporary society. It represents a serious and lasting commitment to others, for a culture of coexistence, civility, and solidarity.

The *Società Umanitaria* is located in the heart of Milan, behind the Palace of Justice, within a former 15th-century Franciscan convent. The complex is divided into four Renaissance cloisters and a former refectory—the *Salone degli Affreschi*—whose painted walls are an invaluable legacy.



## Introduction

Choosing to study in Italy means entering a system and culture that may often differ greatly from those of your home country. You may find yourself navigating complex or unfamiliar bureaucratic procedures.

That's why the **International Student Help Desk - Welcome Desk** was created: a dedicated service of the Scuola Superiore per Mediatori Linguistici "P.M. Loria" - Società Umanitaria for international students arriving in Milan for the first time to enroll in our courses.

The Welcome Desk is your main point of reference for all the essential steps at the beginning of your new journey in Milan and at the University. This short guide is designed to help you remember everything you need to do to:

- obtain the documents required to live in Italy;
- take advantage of the services and opportunities offered by the University;
- register for courses;
- live and get around in the city.

# WHAT TO DO IMMEDIATELY

*when you arrive at University*



## Erasmus+ Incoming Students

If you are arriving at the University under the Erasmus+ Programme, you must go to the **Office for International Mobility and International Promotion** and bring the following with you:

- Passport or another valid form of identification;
- Two passport-sized photos;
- The Erasmus+ student certificate issued by your home university;
- Accident insurance valid abroad;
- The TEAM/EHIC (European Health Insurance Card) for medical assistance;

The office will assist you with:

- Scheduling an appointment with your academic tutor to define the details of your Learning Agreement;
- Getting information on healthcare services and the public transport pass;
- Accessing university services (email address, Wi-Fi, disability services), cultural and social activities, and receiving information about events organized by the Società Umanitaria;
- Receiving the University's free student card, which grants discounts at the campus bar and participating bookstores.

### *Support Service for Students with Disabilities and Specific Learning Disorders (SLD):*

Scuola Superiore per Mediatori Linguistici "P.M. Loria" - Società Umanitaria provides support to students with disabilities and SLD (Specific Learning Disorders), ensuring assistance with learning, digital tools, academic


tutoring, and assessing possible tailored interventions in cases of dyslexia, dyscalculia, dysgraphia, and dysorthography.

# WHAT TO DO IMMEDIATELY

*for Residence Permit Documents*



Whether you are an EU citizen or come from a country outside the European Union, you will need certain essential documents to regularize your stay in Italy. To make it easier for you, we have organized the following information into a step-by-step sequence that we recommend you follow: some documents are better to have first, as you will need them to request other documents.

## Tax Code Number

The "**codice fiscale**" is an identification code issued by the Ministry of Finance, which is necessary for opening a bank account or signing contracts. Citizens residing abroad can request it at the Italian diplomatic or consular representation in their country of residence.

In Italy it should be requested at the nearest "**Ufficio delle Entrate**" (Revenue Agency office) in the city where you reside. A complete list of offices in Lombardy can be found on the website <http://lombardia.agenziaentrate.it/>.

Remember to bring your passport with you.

## Health Insurance

Having valid health insurance for Italy is very important, as it is required to apply for residence permit within 8 days of your arrival in the country. Perhaps you already have an insurance policy from your home country that has been validated by the Italian Representation before departure. However, if you still need to arrange for one, you can choose between two options:

- **Voluntary Registration with the National Health Service (SSN)**: This option lasts for one calendar year (from January 1st to December 31st) and allows you to choose a general practitioner who will provide free healthcare services, prescribe medications, exams, and any necessary specialist visits.
- **Private Insurance - WAI (Welcome Association Italy)**: This policy covers emergency healthcare services in public hospitals. It also

offers additional services depending on the chosen package. For more details, you can visit the <https://www.waitaly.net/>.

## Registration with The National Health Service (SSN):

### *EU Citizens:*

If you already have European health insurance, you can access the **National Health Service (SSN)** during the first three months of your stay in Italy without needing the WAI - Welcome Association Italy private insurance policy.

To subscribe to the **WAI private insurance policy**, you must visit the website <https://www.waitaly.net/>, where you will find detailed information about the services offered, conditions, and payment methods.

The service costs **€120** for 12 months of coverage and **€71** for 6 months of coverage (from the payment date).

If you stay in Italy for more than three months, the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) will entitle you to necessary medical treatments only. For comprehensive health coverage, you will need to request the **S1 form** before departure.

If you have the **S1 form**, you can register for the National Health Service for free by contacting one of the local health offices (ATS - **Agenzia di Tutela della Salute**).

The required documents for registration at the ATS offices are:

- Self-certification of university enrollment
- **Codice Fiscale** (Tax Code)
- A copy of your passport or other identification document
- **S1 form**

If you do not have the S1 form, you can voluntarily register with the SSN by paying a registration fee and following the same procedure as non-EU citizens.

## Non-EU Citizens:

To register for the **National Health Service (SSN)**, you need to follow these steps:

### 1. Pay the registration fee:

- Go to the post office and fill out a payment slip for at least **€700** (the cost of the service valid for one calendar year).
- Pay to the postal current account n. **379222**, made out to **Amministrazione P.T. Regione Lombardia**.
- In the "causale" (payment reason) section, write: **"Iscrizione volontaria al SSN"** (Voluntary registration to the SSN).

### 2. Register at the local ATS office (Agenzia di Tutela della Salute, Health Protection Agency) closest to your place of residence, bringing the following documents:

- Payment receipt;
- **Codice fiscale** (Tax code);
- Passport;
- Receipt of the residence permit application;
- Self-certification of university enrollment.

## Private Insurance WAI - Welcome Association Italy:

To subscribe to the **WAI private insurance policy**, you need to visit the website <https://www.waitaly.net/>, where you will find detailed information about the services offered, terms, and payment methods.

The cost of the service is:

- **€120** for 12 months of coverage **€71** for 6 months of coverage (from the payment date).

## Residence Permit

### First Application:

If you are an **EU citizen**, you don't need a real residence permit, but you must register at the **Registry Office (Ufficio Anagrafe)** of the municipality where you live.

If you live in Milan, you can book an appointment on the website:

**www.comune.milano.it > Online Services > Request or Change of Residence.**

On the day of the appointment, you must bring the following to the Registry Office:

- Passport or identity card; A **photocopy of documentation** proving you have adequate financial resources, such as proof of a scholarship or a bank statement.
- A **copy of the payment receipt** for health insurance.

If you are a **non-EU citizen**, you must fill in and submit the **residence permit application kit**.

The kit can be requested at the **Welcome Desk**, where you'll receive help in completing it. Then you must submit it to one of the **post offices displaying the "Sportello Amico" logo**, along with:

- A **photocopy of your passport** (only the pages with personal data and visa);
- **Documentation related to your chosen study program**, specifying its duration and bearing the stamp of the Italian diplomatic representation that issued the visa (copy of the pre-enrollment application);

- A **copy of the payment receipt** for health insurance, valid for the duration of the residence permit.

The post office will give you a **letter of appointment** with the date on which you must go to the **Immigration Office or local police station**, depending on your registered address.

On the day of the appointment, you must bring:

- The **originals of the documents** included in the kit;
- The **receipt issued by the post office**;
- **2 passport-size photos**.



### **Attention:**

For the first issuance of the residence permit, remember to write the following address in the application kit:

**Via Mercanti, 8 - 20121 Milan.**

This will ensure that your appointment is handled by the **dedicated student desks** at the **Immigration Office (Questura)** located at:

**Via Montebello, 26 - Milan.**

### ***Renewal:***

To renew your residence permit, you must fill out the application kit, specifying that it is a **renewal**.

Submit the completed kit to a **post office with a "Sportello Amico" counter**, along with the following documents:

- **Photocopy of your passport** (only the pages with personal data and visa);
- **Copy of your current residence permit**;
- **Copy of documentation proving adequate financial resources**, such as a certificate of scholarship or bank statement;
- **Certificate of enrollment including the list of exams passed** (if you live in Milan, a self-certification is sufficient);



### **Note:**

It is recommended to start the **renewal process 60 days before** the residence permit expires.

The One-Stop-Shop of the Municipality of Milan can assist you with administrative procedures to obtain a tax code, residence permit, as well as with public transport and health insurance. To book an appointment you can visit the link <https://www.yesmilano.it/en/node/2357>.

### **Costs:**

- €16 for **1 revenue stamp (marca da bollo)** - can be purchased at a tobacconist and must be attached to the residence permit application;
- €30 to be paid at the post office for **processing the application**;
- €70.46 to be paid at the post office for the **issuance of the electronic residence permit**.

## **Bank Account**

To open a bank account, you must:

- Be at least **18 years old**;
- Have a **valid identity document**;

- Have a **tax code (codice fiscale)**;
- **Not have been involved in commercial bankruptcies**;
- **Deposit a small initial amount.**



**Note:**

Most bank branches are open from 8:30 AM to 1:30 PM and from 3:00 PM to 4:00 PM.



# LIVING IN MILAN

## Exploring the City

Milan is a strange city; you'll realize this once you live here. Unlike cities like Venice, Florence, or Rome, where monuments and masterpieces dominate the urban landscape, Milan doesn't have this. Yet, there's still so much to see—you just need to discover it.

Milan is perhaps more famous for its fashion, theater, and the international flair of its fairs. However, it hides some beautiful corners that you'll only find if you know where to look, or if you wander aimlessly, nose in the air, or peek into the internal courtyards of the city center's buildings, which are often stunning.

Once upon a time, Milan was a city you could navigate by water—though certainly not like Venice. It was Leonardo Da Vinci who improved the navigation of the canals and waterways that connected Milan to the Ticino and Adda rivers, designing a system of locks. He also left the city with the famous fresco *The Last Supper*. To see it, you need to book a ticket online at [www.vivaticket.it](http://www.vivaticket.it).

There are the masterpieces of the Pinacoteca di Brera, and beautiful Romanesque churches like the Basilica of Sant'Ambrogio and the Basilica of Sant'Eustorgio, where, legend has it, the remains of the Three Wise Men are kept (which Sant'Eustorgio brought from Constantinople). In the heart of the city stands the imposing Gothic structure of the Duomo, always a symbol of Milan.

Additionally, there are many excursions you can take in the surrounding areas, with information available on the website [Yes Milano](http://www.yesmilano.it) or the Lombardy Region's tourism site. From Milan, you can quickly reach Lake Como, Lake Maggiore, and Lake Garda, the Alps, the Ligurian Sea, and in just two and a half hours by train, Venice.

Alternatively, you can stay in the city and enjoy sports at one of the many centers managed by the city ([www.milanosport.it/](http://www.milanosport.it/)) or simply indulge in Milan's vibrant life: from the now-unmissable happy hours in the city center or on the Navigli canals, to nights in clubs, theaters, cinemas (often with films in their original language), or wandering through museums, many of which are open until late.

For inspiration, you can visit [Lombardia Spettacolo](http://www.lombardia.spettacolo.it/) or *Vivi Milano* (<https://vivimilano.corriere.it/>), or ask for advice at the Informagiovani service of the Municipality of Milan, located at Via Dogana 2 (near Piazza Duomo).

## Transportation

### *Public Transportation:*

In Milan and its surrounding areas, getting around is very convenient with public transportation (trams, buses, and the metro). You'll find it easy to navigate by checking out the website of *Azienda Trasporti Milanese* (ATM) at [www.atm.it](http://www.atm.it), which also offers a Radiobus service—a collective taxi that's both practical and affordable.

You can pay for your ATM ticket directly at the turnstile using contactless cards that are part of the Mastercard, Visa, Maestro, or VPay networks. Students can apply for monthly or annual passes at discounted rates.

The Integrated Fare System of the Mobility Basin (STIBM) covers all the municipalities within the Metropolitan City of Milan and the Province of Monza and Brianza. The system is designed with Milan as the central reference point, from which the surrounding areas are divided into concentric fare zones.

## **Car Sharing, Bikes and Trains:**

If you can't imagine living without a car, take a look at the *Car Sharing* service [here](#). Renting a car, even for just a few hours, turns out to be quite affordable.

For those who love to explore the city by bike, the city offers the *BikeMi* rental service ([www.bikemi.com](http://www.bikemi.com)) or you can check out the website of the *Ciclobby* association ([www.ciclobby.it](http://www.ciclobby.it)), which has been promoting cycling in urban areas for years and organizing group bike tours.

For trips outside the city, there are useful websites like Trenitalia ([www.trenitalia.it](http://www.trenitalia.it)), Milan's airports at Linate, Malpensa ([www.sea-aeroportimilano.it](http://www.sea-aeroportimilano.it)), and Orio al Serio ([www.orioaeroporto.it](http://www.orioaeroporto.it)), as well as *Autostradale* ([www.autostradale.it](http://www.autostradale.it)), which lists schedules and costs for buses connecting Milan to some of Italy's top tourist destinations.

### **Emergencies:**


It's important to remember that in Italy, the healthcare system is public and free of charge, especially in cases of emergency.

Almost every hospital in the city has an **Emergency Room (Pronto Soccorso)** - you can find a complete list on the "**Salutile Pronto Soccorso**" app. In case

of need, you can go directly to one of these facilities. If you're unable to reach the nearest hospital, you can call the **Single Emergency Number 112**.

If you find yourself in danger or urgently need protection, you can also dial **112** to contact the **State Police** ([www.poliziadistato.it](http://www.poliziadistato.it)), the **Carabinieri** ([www.carabinieri.it](http://www.carabinieri.it)), or in case of fire, the **Fire Department** ([www.vig-ilfuoco.it](http://www.vig-ilfuoco.it)).
