Entry requirements for Bachelor students

- Having completed 90 EC with a C average (ECTS system) in a relevant discipline before starting in the Exchange Programme Social and Behavioural Sciences.
- Please note that for advanced courses having completed 120 EC will be required.
- A GPA equivalent to at least a C (ECTS-system) or a "good".
- Non-native speakers of English have to submit one of the following English proficiency tests with the following minimum scores:
 - o TOEFL (International) IBT 92
 - o TOEFL (International) PBT 570
 - o IELTS 6.5
 - Language assessment in the Erasmus Mobility Tool: minimum B2 ECFR

- Entrance requirements for Master students

NB: In some cases we can accept institutional tests. If, in your opinion, the English test reports of your institution should be accepted by us, please contact us. A test score is valid for a period of two years.

Application Procedure

- 1) We are using a nomination and application portal. We kindly request you to nominate your selected students using the information and link to the UvA system that has been sent to you by email.
- 2) After having nominated your students, you will receive an email with a confirmation of your nomination(s).
- 3) After checking your nomination(s) an email will be sent to your students with instructions:
 - a. to activate their University of Amsterdam account.
 - b. to log in to the University of Amsterdam's application portal and to submit their application, which consists of:
 - uploading a photocopy of the identity page of their passport,
 - uploading their transcript
 - if applicable, submitting their English language test result.
- 4) For non-native speakers of English: the official English test report can come in later (sent to us directly by the testing organization), but at the latest on 1 August 2024.

Students will be informed on their acceptance within 4 weeks after the application deadline.

Courses

Most courses are 6 ECTS (one block, 8 weeks) or 12 ECTS (two blocks, 16 weeks) and are offered mainly in the first two blocks of the semester. Students are expected to take a minimum of 24 ECTS per semester. A maximum of 36 ECTS per semester is allowed, but not recommended since this is a very high workload for 16 weeks.

Students are expected to have an appropriate background in the field they choose. Most of the English-taught courses are third-year courses (final bachelor year). The exchange programme also offers more introductory level courses that serve as a starting course in one of the minors. Next to these courses, students can pre-register for courses at another faculty, for example from the BSc Future Planet Studies, elective courses of the Institute for Interdisciplinary Studies and of the *Exchange Programme College of Humanities*. Please note that students from the own faculty have priority, which means that it is much harder to get into courses of other faculties.

Placement in courses always depends on the educational background of students and on places available. Students are strongly advised to have alternatives at hand during course registration. Changes in course registration after the course registration period will not be possible. When placement in courses of their choice is not possible, we can discuss options with the students individually before the start of the semester. Please note that we cannot guarantee placement in specific courses as the allocation in courses is done via a lottery system. If a student needs a specific course we can try to accommodate, if the partner university confirms that this particular student needs this course.

Housing

The Amsterdam housing market is extremely challenging. UvA International Student Housing has a limited number of rooms reserved for roughly half of the newly incoming international students every semester. Please note that accommodation therefore cannot be guaranteed. After acceptance, in May (for semester 1) and in November (for semester 2) the student will receive an email about the application procedure for student housing (lottery). The rental periods are always fixed periods. Exchange students will automatically be assigned for one or two semesters (depending on the duration of the exchange).

Please note that the chances to find a room are significantly higher in the spring semester.

We recommend students to withdraw their exchange if they cannot find a place to live beforethey arrive.

D. Additional requirements

Study programme for exchange students

- ☐ It is not possible for students to hand- in their final BA-/MA-/PhD-thesis at the host institution. Final theses need to be graded and supervised by the home institution.
- □ Exchange students are expected to stay and study for the complete duration of the semester. It is not possible to arrive later than the start date of the semester, nor to end the exchange before the end of the semester (special circumstances excepted).
- \Box It is not possible to attend courses as an auditor. Students have to attend all sessions and participate actively in class discussions and presentations, and are also required to take the exam(s).
- □ Exchange students nominated to the Faculty of Humanities are expected to take their courses at the Faculty of Humanities. They must have obtained **60 ECTS** within the Humanities before they can start their exchange. Exchange students do not need to limit themselves to the study area of the exchange agreement and can choose courses from the complete range of study areas within the faculty of Humanities. It is sometimes possible for students to take 1 or 2 courses at another faculty, but this cannot be guaranteed.

Master programmes

- Master students need to send a bachelor's degree including a transcript of records OR a
 transcript of records with 180 EC in the study area to the Admissions & International Office
 Humanities. Acceptance into courses on MA level is dependent on the approval of the MA
 coordinator. An official English language certificate is obligatory to participate in English
 taught MA courses.
- Since the number of available MA courses is limited during the 2nd semester we only accept nominations for the 2nd semester upon special request, please consult with us first before sending a MA student for the 2nd semester.
- Courses of selective Master's programmes (such as Research Masters and professional Masters) are not open to exchange students.
- Master level courses are often fully booked and have very specific entry requirements.

Credit system	The standard workload for full- time students is 60 EC per academic year (1680 hours of study) or 30 EC per semester (840 hours of study).
Workload	The credit system is based on student workload. Student workload does not only consist of lectures and seminars, but also of individual study. The workload is expressed in credit points based on the ECTS.
	1 EC represents 25-30 hours of full-time study, including lecture attendance, hours spent on individual study and preparation of assignments.
Language	Courses are taught in Dutch or in English. Courses in the field of Modern European languages mostly use Dutch as a source language, but are sometimes taught entirely in the target language.
Duration of programmes	A Bachelor's programme (Bachelor of Arts) has a duration of three years and consists of 180 EC. A Master's programme (Master of Arts) has a duration of one year and 60 EC. Selective Research MA programmes take 2 years and consist of 120 EC. The selective Dual MA programmes take 1.5 years and consist of 90 EC.
Type of education	There are different types of education. Lectures are frequently used as well as seminars self-study. In seminars active participation is expected. Students are expected to attend all classes. The first course of the semester is always mandatory. Canvas is the online system that is used to post literature, discussions, exams and other information.
Assessment	Many different forms of assessment are practiced: oral exams, written exams, essays, papers, class room presentations and assignments.
Academic climate	The UvA places a strong emphasis on independent and critical thinking. Students are expected to study independently. There is a lot of self-study required. It is not uncommon that students are expected to read two or three books by themselves in a week for any particular course. Students find the academic climate challenging but rewarding.
	Exams and assessment are not only scheduled at the end of a course but students can also find themselves doing weekly assignments such as small essays or book reports. Most courses have mid-term as well as final exams or papers.

University Accommodation

Amsterdam has a housing shortage so it is very difficult for students to find a room. Since Dutch universities are not allowed to own housing properties under Dutch law, **the UvA** cannot facilitate accommodations for all incoming international students. Students are responsible for their own accommodation.

Exchange students receive information on the registration for accommodation from the UvA Housing Office for housing with third party housing providers. Please note, there is **no guarantee** that students will receive housing through the University of Amsterdam and that the majority of the dorms are **outside** the city centre.

We try to offer all students registered for housing an accommodation, however if the demand is higher than the number of rooms available then we cannot offer everyone a room. Therefore, students are recommended to also search for housing on the private market themselves.

Accommodation in Amsterdam is expensive. Rents is between 330 and 950 per month, depending on the type and size of the room. Rent does not included administrative costs and a refundable deposit. The UvA charges a housing fee for the students who apply for housing through the UvA.

Research Master Urban Studies

The two-year Research Master's in Urban Studies deals with questions surrounding the increasing urbanisation of today's world. Cities are characterised by economic, social, political and cultural opportunities, but also carry risks of social problems, inequality and security issues. In this programme, you will learn to research and analyse these challenges.

The Research Master Urban Studies welcomes incoming exchange students in the first semester only.

Incoming exchange students to the Research Master Urban Studies are required to have a solid academic background (30 ECTS) in disciplines or courses that are relevant to the Urban Studies programme. Relevant backgrounds include Human Geography, Urban and Regional Planning and Urban Sociology, among others. Students are also required to have sufficient background (30 ECTS) in research methodologies, particularly those relevant for the social sciences, with both qualitative and quantitative approaches. In addition to this, incoming exchange students to the Research Master Urban Studies are expected to have an independent and pro-active study approach. We expect students to have performed above average in their Bachelor's programme and to have the ambition to pursue at leasa research career in academia or a research-oriented position in relevant professional fields like urban and regional planning, housing, social policy or real estate.

Courses

During their exchange programme in the Research Master Urban Studies incoming exchange students are required to take at least on the two core modules of the programme: either the core module Advanced Urban Studies (12 ECTS or the module Philosophy of Science for Urban and Development Studies (6 ECTS). Of course students can also take both. . Please be aware that the Philosophy of Science for Urban and Development Studies is a very advanced course with a fast pace. Students should be well prepared for this when entering the course.

Next to these courses students can choose among a number of thematic electives offered by the masters Human Geography, Urban & Regional Planning and International Development studies (block 1 and 2).). Note that placement in these elective courses depends on availability of places and possible additional entrance requirements.

As a rule exchange students in the Research Master Urban Studies do not attend courses at bachelor's level.

All incoming exchange students are administered in the Exchange Programme - Social and Behavioural Sciences and will be hosted in the Research Master Urban Studies and will participate with the students of this programme in Orientation Meetings and other activities.

Housing

The *University of Amsterdam housing office* will send students information on the housing procedures by the end of May. The rental periods are always fixed periods. Exchange students will automatically be assigned for the first semester in case they are allotted student housing though the university. In the past year we experienced a huge shortage in student housing as we were only able to accommodate approximately half of the incoming exchange students. Students are therefore advised to start looking on the private market as soon as possible as they know they are nominated for the UvA. Students who cannot secure accommodation before the start of the semester are advised to withdraw from the programme.
